 - (b) Read not to contradict and confute, nor to believe and take for granted, nor to find talk and discourse, but to weigh and

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- consider. Some books are to be tasted, others to be swallowed, and some few to be chewed and digested.
- (c) I deny not, but that it is of greatest concernment in the Church and Commonwealth, to have a vigilant eye how books themselves as well as men; and thereafter to confine, imprison, and do sharpest justice on them as malefactors.
- (d) Who kills a man kills a reasonable creature, God's image; but he who destorys a good book, kills reason itself, kills the image of God, as it were in the eye.
